# Findings organised around concept of Strategic Interactivity

*Strategic Interactivity (SI) involves evaluators in the use of socially interactive and methodological strategies over time, and over a series of evaluative activities to meet the information need of an organisational client with a view to engendering evaluation capacity in that organisation.*

*(Cummings and Owen, 2010)*

Capacity: Ability of people, organisations and societies as a whole to manage their affairs successfully (OECD DAP 2006)

Evaluation Capacity: Ability of an organisation to successfully manage the conduct of the evaluative process.

# Findings suggest

- a. organisational evaluation benefits if SI continues, but
- b. does not lead to evaluative capacity

# Role for Evaluation Capacity Building to achieve (b)?

*Evaluation Capacity Building is intentional work to continuously create and sustain overall organisational processes to make quality evaluation and its uses routine. (Stockdil, Baizerman et al., 2002)*

*Issues: Do we encourage organisations to create ECB positions? In addition to, or instead of, SI evaluators?*
