- Program Level: synthesis across outcome areas and core indicators, VfM, independent review, M&E Systems Review etc
- Project Level: alignment with program outcome areas, guiding principles, but flexibility with approaches

What did we focus on

 We reviewed not just MEFs, but also data collection tools, and raw, analysed and reported data.



What was involved

In Australia – 6 mths into implementation

- ANGOs completed a self-assessment
- Review workshop
 - technical critique + facilitated peer review by other NGOs (DFAT observed)
 - then the NGOs swapped (1/2 day/ NGO)

In Africa – 10 mths into implementation

- ANGOs + African partners + DFAT
- NGOs completed a self-assessment
- Review workshop
- Culminated in an innovations workshop

10 NGOs • 11 countries • 2.3 million lives improved

The Australia Africa Community Engagement Scheme (AACES) represented a new, collaborative model to deliver foreign aid programs.

This was a genuine partnership in which knowledge sharing and innovation flourished. AACES was also underpinned by substantial investment in program design and best practice M&E.

The result was a suite of highly successful programs that delivered outstanding value. For example, by targeting women with poor access to sexual health services, an estimated 260,000 unintended pregnancies will be prevented across Kenya and Tanzania. That means a saving of around \$A21million in healthcare costs.

Elsewhere, over 14,000 people with disability benefited from new support services. And thousands of families have been empowered by programs that helped them increase and diversify their income.

Most imporantly, AACES' programs were engineered to create lasting change. By working with local and district governments as well as the private sector, NGOs created systems that will continue to improve people's lives into the future.
