



# Utilising a state-wide evaluation approach to capture data from diverse communities and direct future initiatives in Western Australia



#### **Background and context**


- Royalties for Regions (RfR) initiated in 2008
- > Over \$6 billion invested
- ➤ 3600+ projects and programs
- The Department of Regional Development (DRD) administers the RfR program.





## **Regional Development Strategy 2016-2025**


- > Released in June 2016
- Developed in conjunction with all major portfolio partners
- Building upon Royalties for Regions efforts so far.





#### What is the environment?

- Western Australia is Australia's biggest state and the 2<sup>nd</sup> largest state in the world
- Perth is the most isolated city in the world
- > Key challenges:
  - o Remoteness and diversity of regions
  - Diversity of projects
  - o Consequences of the RfR environment



- Affects evaluation outcomes, findings and learnings.




RfR expenditure by category 2008-2016

- No data = evaluation unlikely to produce robust findings




## **Evaluation providing clarity?**


- Environments can lead to a fuzzy picture

## **Evaluation Framework guiding evaluation**






## Key Evaluation Question helping us to understand






