Focus: 14 Pacific Island Forum countries


Funded by the Government of Australia as part of its commitment to work for improved equality and empowerment of women

Cultural practices passed down from generations limit women

Leads to gender based violence

High cost to health, wellbeing, education, families, communities and the national economy





The PNG *Pacific Women* Program priority change areas

- Increased women's leadership and influence in decision-making, including at local government level
- 2. Increased economic opportunities for women
- 3. Strengthened national response to violence against women and expanded support services
- 4. Enhanced knowledge and evidence to inform policy and practice







Limited phone and internet access


High workloads
