












ECB and the strategic triangle

Evaluation in a school setting



Teachers evaluate personal teaching and learning programs using evidence, including feedback from students and student assessment data, to inform planning.

Standard 3.6.2 (Proficient level)



Teachers provide and receive planned constructive feedback from peers, school leaders and students to improve teaching practice

Teaching / Collaborative practice (Sustaining and Growing)



Principals... evaluate the personal and organisational effects of change through regular feedback from stakeholders and evidence of impact on student outcomes.



What is cognitive bias?


Cognitive bias occurs where our analysis of a situation is compromised by 'mental shortcuts' or patterns of thinking that place undue emphasis on a particular perspective.




