AROSH HAS A LOT TO SMILE ABOUT

Under the shade off the tin roof, Arosh breaks into a big smile. Even after the smack of a pomelo on the roof causes us all all to jump and launches us to a fit of giggles, Arosh's smile doesn't go away.

Arosh has begun raising ducks with the Mogal Bazar poultry cluster with the support of her neighbor Kokila. Even though she only started recently, Arosh already has 18 ducks who are producing valuable quality eggs.

Ducks are more rare in this region, but their novelty helps to bring a good market price, but even with this good price she is only selling 40%. Another 40% go to feed her big family of eight members and 20% are raised for ducklings.

Arosh's husband has a vegetable nursery, but is happy to help her purchase feed for her ducks or to bring them to the nearby haor or wetland for natural feed. This new found partnership with her husband is helping to build Arosh's confidence.

Arosh hopes to buy a goat in the next six months and a cow early next year; converting her eggs to a cow would ensure that she can provide nutritious foods such as milk and cheese to her whole family on a regular basis.
